It looks like I have to make an entry in all my studies with a loco keyword in order to find my work from now on. This is just asinine.

I agree with Tan that subjects should be included in searches. I have made subjects in the past as an easy way to find particular studies or recurring issues. Making a category for all studies seems to be a bit much.

Subjects can be easily found via the filter page by simply typing in a sub string of the subject title in the input box named "Subjects". What Tan is doing is using a common phrase in his subjects to group multiple different studies, this is exactly what categories are intended for. Since his studies have spanned multiple years I think the simple process of asking for a "LOCO Studies" category is perfectly acceptable.

Tan, help yourself and show some professionalism when requesting changes to the elog. Its apparent you haven't taken any time to explore the new features of the elog.

However, I did find a bug while testing this feature. It is currently looking at case sensitivity when it shouldn't.
